Thank you to Ange and Bec in the Junior area for assistance with their renewals and compliance with Working with Children Checks and Ben for Member manuals and Surfguard updating.

We have a mandatory policy that all full and junior members 15+ have a current WWCC. These last 5 years and are recorded on your Surfguard record, and if needing renewal, you will receive an email and it can be reactivated by the Secretary.











A highlight of regular shopping trips for the Bar and other incidentals, to assist both Sally and Jeff in their roles, amused other customers as Jeff and I overfilled several trolleys at

the supermarket for the Junior Carnival. This was after assisting with a First Aid incident outside before we began! We had a busy band of volunteers to organise food and drinks for the Junior Carnival, thank you all for your cheerful assistance.

Perpetual trophies have been found and updated, and this year's recipients presented with individual ones at our Annual Dinner.

Thank you for lots of laughs and hard work to all my fellow Club Councillors, and all who have assisted me as Secretary this, and past seasons. The Secretary role continues after the summer has passed, this year with a few additional tasks. I acknowledge the support of many, especially Ben to facilitate the Annual Report, Dinner and Awards.

Treasurer

From the outset I would like to acknowledge the ongoing commitment of our membership and specifically that of volunteers without whom we would not exist.

The Club faced a confronting challenge during the past year but met its financial obligations. Having experienced a significant increase in operating expenses during 2022/23, that trend continued during the Club's second year in the new building at Horseshoe Bay. Despite that challenge the Club recorded a net profit of \$15,692 after depreciation of \$35,686.

2023/24 saw the Club transition from internal accounting to that of an external contract with SLSSA, it is a service which will serve the Club well going forward.

Key features of 2023/24

Bar Trade

The Club accepted the challenge of attempting to meet the demands of peak season trade from December 26 to February 4 for the first time. Bar trade was the dominant feature for the year with net bar income exceeding \$101, 839 compared to \$44,839 in 2023. Providing the required service for the public holiday market at the Beach Bar was a massive challenge for volunteers. The Club is indebted to the support of the Middleton Tavern whose rebate on purchases of \$13,138 equated to the Club's highest sponsorship.

Food Trade

Gross takings increased dramatically to \$85k, the Club benefit was that of a fixed rate offset against outgoings and secure public liability insurance by the contractor.

Operational cost increases on the previous year

This is the subject of major concern going forward, some of it was discretionary, others not so:

- Cleaning & Electricity \$24,298
- Administration \$16,417; Included Office expenses, Printing and SLSSA Book Keeping.
- Building Expenses \$13,667; Included Rates, Fire Safety and Repairs
- Marketing \$13,832; Live Entertainment, Social Media, Website upgrade was budgeted.
- Life Saving Operations \$11,170, Repairs, Competition Expenses.
- Members Bar Discounts \$6,909 (not recorded previously).











Total increase over the previous year \$86,293

Capital Purchases

The Club spent \$45,955 last year as follows:

- Clubrooms: Members Room carpet and sofa
- Competition Equipment: Body Boards
- Office Equipment: Computer and printer
- Plant and Equipment: Safe, Tables, Kitchen, and Gym equipment.
- Powercraft.

The challenges going forward

Without significant hospitality and sponsorship income the Club will face a budget deficit.

Hospitality - members will know that Harcourts have advertised seeking a contractor for our hospitality services. Nationally the industry has never faced such challenging times, in addition the South Coast also experiences a significant seasonal impact on trade.

Sponsorship - we must improve our representation in the local market. The Club provides outstanding services to the broader community during peak season, a fact which should meet support.

The internal challenge for both portfolios is that neither were represented at Club Council for the full year reflecting the difficulty of same. Food and Beverage experience is essential for one and the capacity to 'sell or market' the other.

Failure to address this challenge will require the Council to adjust its budget. Put simply we must record strong profitability to allow investment in life-saving activities in our 92nd year.

I have had an interesting and busy year as Club Captain. We seem to have the "downstairs" area of the Club running well. The delivery of lifesaving services is something we can all be proud of. Having filled in with most of our Patrols it appears that numbers are generally good, although some Patrols have been short, so a big thanks to all those who have done voluntary patrols. Some restructuring may need to be done next year.

The new Inflatable Rescue Boat (IRB), trailer and motor has increased our options for patrolling and water cover. The damage to the twin-hull was not deemed repairable. Congratulations to all those who obtained their Driver's and Crew awards, the conditions at Goolwa for their examinations were certainly challenging! Well done to our trainers. The increase in IRB personnel area has made Patrols more versatile, and the purchase of more life jackets means that hopefully everyone can get a jacket, when needed, that fits!

One good mystery solved this season is, "How many flags on surveillance/standby?". Answer: None, no flags and ready to respond are the new criteria. Some may not agree, however that is the new standard from SLSSA.

Over summer most Patrols would have seen the group of three breakwater fishers, and yes, the inevitable happened. One of our Chilean friends ended up in the water inside the breakwater. Commodore Patrol was quickly on the scene with the IRB and the crew performed an exemplary tube rescue. Apparently, the patient was more concerned about his fishing gear than his own survival, and English language was not his greatest strength. So, who came to his rescue? Port Elliot's own Spanish speaking IRB crew! Well done Georgia and Rachel, it all ended well.

Whether it is a tube rescue, a missing person or just a Band-Aid, we can all be proud of the way our Patrolling members have performed this season. Well done to all. And certainly, a big thank you to all members who made the Junior Carnival such a success.

The Beach Bar and the kitchen has had its challenges and not all things tried have worked. In some ways the upstairs became a victim of its own success, with the popularity we all wanted creating unreasonable pressure on the volunteers. To all the volunteers who weathered the storm of the Beach Bar over the summer, a big thank you too.

One positive from last Summer is that we now have an idea of what will work for next Summer. Unless something is tried, how would we know? Capital purchases were made making the workload in that area lesser and simpler. Of those items I think the ice machine for the bar would get the number one vote, followed by the barrels on the balcony.











The upstairs area is still challenging, as it has been for our fellow clubs on the south coast. I'm sure we will find our niche in the hospitality market in the future. This may require some difficult decisions to be made by Club Council. We can no longer afford to hope for the best for money to roll in so we can keep the doors open. To put it simply the old club had one air conditioner and the new club has fifteen and the running costs have increased in a similar manner.

All club members need to acquaint themselves of the current and ongoing costs of the new building, so that as a group we can make decisions that will take us into the future.

It would be remiss not to mention the incredible support of the Middleton Tavern over the year and in particular Nigel's help and advice.

It will be proficiencies before we know it!

Lifesaving Services

Throughout the 23-24 season, our dedicated patrolling members volunteered 4,746 hours keeping our beach safe. That's 412 hours more than the previous season. We are proud to report that these patrolling efforts resulted in 1 rescue, 35 first aid interventions, and 45 preventative actions, demonstrating our commitment to maintaining a safe environment for all beach users.

Thank you to all our hardworking trainers and assessors for continuing to upskill new and current members over the season. Your work is greatly appreciated and without you we wouldn't have the skills and knowledge to effectively keep our community safe.

This season a number of members went above and beyond with the time they committed to the service. 18 of our club members contributed greater than 50 hours. What a phenomenal effort!

I would also like to mention our members who go above and beyond by volunteering their time outside of our club in our state emergency operations club. We have Jetboat Crew, Drone, Jet Ski, and Surfcom Operators as well as Duty Officers. Thank you all for your continued efforts to keep our state and community safe.

Chief Instructor

I held the position of Chief Instructor this season but was not a member of Club Council.

Season 23-24 was another busy training year at Port Elliot Surf Lifesaving Club. Over the offseason Kirk Dixon and Jeff Collins with the assistance of Dave Read and Dave Palmer trained a Silver Medallion IRB drivers and IRB crew squad. Training new IRB drivers is a time-consuming process due to the number of logbook hours they need to accrue, so I thank all the trainers for the hours they invested.

In the October school holidays we again held the SRC and SRC-to-Bronze intensive courses for our youth. This allows them to obtain their awards at the commencement of the season and then be available for patrols, water cover and competition. I thank Jeff Collins for training the SRC and Ben Jucius for assisting with the Bronze Medallion course.

Proficiencies ran over 4 days in late November/early December. The consensus on delaying proficiencies until this time of year has been positive due to the weather/water generally being warmer. I thank Ian Grant (water), Ben Wyschnja (radio), Michael Lippett (ATV) and Verity Remilton (resus) for their assistance across the 4 days. Ian and Verity also assisted with the 2 ARTC proficiencies held separately.

Jeff Collins, assisted by Darren Flynn and Kerry Bird-Harris, again ran the Saturday Bronze/SRC course which was assessed early March. This course ran every Saturday throughout the season until the squad was ready for assessment. I thank the trainers for attending every week to allow this to happen.

Chris Michelmore again ensured we had adequate Nipper leaders/water safety by training parents in the Nipper Water Safety Certificate and ensuring others had done their SRC proficiency.

Adam Foot with the assistance of Jeff Collins trained a group of students from Victor Harbor High School for their Bronze Medallion during term 1. Whilst this is part of their school subject, we always welcome them to join us next season to patrol or compete.

Ian Grant continues to be busy as a state assessor assessing all surf awards. We thank him for representing PESLSC across the state as he does this.

Development

The development of our Club members in their skills, education and opportunities continues to be an important part of the Port Elliot Surf Lifesaving Club.

This season has seen a large amount of training in the SRC, Bronze and IRB awards, with both pre and in season pathways offered. We offer a huge thankyou to the many hours of service given by our expert trainers.

Surf lifesaving SA offered a 5-day Lifesaving Development for 16–17-year-olds In December 2023 at Chiton Rocks Surf Lifesaving Club. It is an opportunity to develop leadership and aquatic search and rescue skills. Participants undertake several advanced surf lifesaving awards, culminating in the certificate 3 in Public Safety (Aquatic Search and Rescue). Port Elliot proudly had two club members attend, Amelie Van Zijl and Summer Byerlee to develop their skills, knowledge and leadership. Their feedback after the camp included, "I feel as if this camp has really opened my pathways into surf, since the course I have been able to gain employment opportunities, complete my IRB crew , and begin training to be a jet boat crew." And "I aim to use my cert 3 to help with employment and use my pool lifeguard to get casual work, I aim to become more involved using my IRB certificate and SMAR qualifications. I have learnt so much about what there is on offer, since then I have been given various opportunities to visit and express my interest to join different services."

Further youth members then took the opportunities offered by Surf Lifesaving SA to gain their certificate 3 through alternate pathways.

Club Championships was a fun day for members to celebrate their season and both juniors and seniors participated with healthy competition across all ages. It was fantastic to watch the Club camaraderie on the day and the top competitors came away with a 'golden fish' for their efforts.

All crews rowed to the best of their ability and achieved benchmarks to be proud of. The teamwork on the beach being a great indicator of where the club is heading in the future as we further 'Familyfy' our boat area. Already many of our crews have family members competing for the red, black and gold across several divisions. The biggest winner is Surf Boat rowing for Pt Elliot SLSC, from zero crews at the Senior State Titles last season to five determined crews this year.

In the Reserve Men's division, the Good OI' Boys crew of Mark Williams, Peter Radcliffe, Bryce Walker, Michael Lippett and sweep Stephen Tummel rowed energetically in all their round robin races giving many years up to the large field of younger crews. Samewave

Samewave has completed it's 23/24 season with its participants achieving great new things. We have had an average of 10 participants every Saturday and they have enjoyed a range of activities designed to give them confidence in and around water. They have spent time at Horseshoe Bay, stand up paddle boarding at Encounter Lakes, snorkeling at The Bluff, surfing at Middleton and exploring the shoreline of Yilki.

While games and activities create a fun way for these people to gain confidence and skills, the end goal is to enable them to keep themselves safe and to recognize others who may be in difficulty in the water and to possibly help. This is no small task for these people, as most have some sort of learning issue. This year we set them a challenge to learn the basic skills that all surf life savers have. How to recognize a person in trouble in the water and possible cause, eg a rip. They had to learn the signals that are common to patrolling members. Rescue techniques, semi dry, eg throwing a rope or flotation device, board rescue and tube rescue. They also learnt spinal management, basic first aid and how to find the important things in a first aid kit. Basic CPR and what phone number to call in an emergency.

However, the big achievement by the participants was not only learning these skills, but also showing others that they can remember, understand and put them into practice, and they did in front of an examiner. Thanks to Ian Grant's help, most of our participants demonstrated their knowledge and skills and were awarded a certificate from Surf Life Saving SA. This, we believe, is the first-time certificates of this type have been awarded to people with disabilities in surf lifesaving.

The training of these skills takes a lot of repetition and patience by the carers and parents who regularly provide support on Saturdays to ensure these people get a quality of life that equals our own, support also by the leaders of the group Danny Smith, Richard Huffam, Mark Morelli, Mark Williams, Micheal Lippett and occasionally Natalie Tavener.

Over the years people have asked the leaders of Samewave, why do you do it? Generally, our response is, "To see the participants gain confidence and because they put a smile on our faces." At other times we've been told that it's dangerous for them to go surfing or swimming in the middle of the bay. We explain the safety measures we take but also the freedom we give them. Often, we finish the discussion with, "Give them a chance to surprise you."

Radios

The method of communication used by the lifesaving community in the early 1900's and up until relativity recent times was with flags. The direction of movement of Seabourne activity was the code of signals using a blue and white quartered flag, 2 in the patrol and 2 in the new wooden double ended converted whale boats in use at the time -how we have progressed since then.

The Pt Elliot Club 'to my knowledge' was one of the first to use radio as communication between watercraft and the beach. initially we used HF frequencies, a so-called Mickey Mouse method, then progressed to VHF and finally to our present-day usage of Ultra High Frequencies, UHF, handheld and base radio for communication.

I must record our appreciation to George Scarfe for his early days help in setting this up, which I believe became the first State to have a viable radio network.

Over the years we have been recognised for our care of our radios, its important to remember their expense then and now. Our current membership is carrying on with the high standard of care and I thank you for your diligence.

I have frequently stressed the importance of our radios; today's operations require the adjuncts of specialised equipment. most of all radio communication. as such it is vital we keep our radios well cared for and our skills up to speed.

Once again thank you all for your diligence. With all electronic equipment there is maintenance, new chargers and batteries as well as some repair required as we have experienced this year, all at a running cost.
